MINUTES

Montevallo City Council Work Session
April 26, 2021
5:30 p.m. at City Hall

Mayor Rusty Nix, Council Member David King, Council Member Lelia Mitchell, Council Member Kenneth Dukes, Council Member Sonya Swords, Council Member Martha Eisenberg, were in attendance. Quorum present.

Work Session called to order at 5:30 p.m. by Mayor Rusty Nix.

Chief Littleton presented the Police Department Monthly Report. Chief Littleton reported there was 49 Total Reports, 120 Traffic Citations, and 35 Total Arrests. Officer Mike Wilder's Report showed a total of three cases addressing properties that had: Overgrown Grass and Weeds, Trash and/or Debris, Inoperable Vehicles; three continuances, and a Total Number of Cases for the Year is 32. See Appendix 1.

Chief Davis presented the Fire Department Monthly Report with a total of 50 calls: 31 EMS calls, 6 Lift Assists, 2 Structure Fires and 2 applications. Councilman Dukes inquired about the brush trailer and Chief Davis advised it was in route to arrive this week.

Councilman Dukes called on Olivia Barone, Sustainability Coordinator. She announced James Whetsone, Sanitation Driver is a finalist for a nationally recognized Driver of the Year Award. She reminded Council about the Weatherization Program in which Gov. Kay Ivey has awarded grants totaling \$3.2 million to assist low-income, elderly, and disabled Alabama residents to lower energy costs and if anyone had questions, they could call the Central Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commission at 334-262-4300 ext. 217. She reported since ALDOT approved the permit to convert the lights on state routes, Alabama Power has been replacing the streetlights to LED on Hwy. 119 and Hwy. 25 and the work should be close to complete if not done. She was a client in the University's Environmental of Montevallo Capstone Course advised the students will be giving a presentation a brief report under New Business to address the outcome of work. She reported Earth Day was a huge success with more than 100 participants. She reported Montevallo was one of 25 communities selected to the national Thriving Earth Exchange program to work on a community project and this is in partnership with IMPACT Montevallo. Councilwoman Mitchell asked about the lighting on Selma Road and Olivia said we are waiting on ALDOT approval. Stone & Sons are doing repairs on light at Hwy. 25 at Lucky's intersection. See Appendix 2.

Councilwoman Eisenberg called on Shane Baugh, Parks and Recreation Director, and he reported tournaments are ongoing and there will be a run held this week. He reported there is an issue with water on the fields and is working to remedy.

Councilwoman Mitchell reported on the Education, Arts and Outreach Committee and advised they held a meeting on Wednesday, April 21st, 2021 in Council Chambers. Montevallo Schools closed Friday, April 23rd for April Break. 2021 Graduation for the University of Montevallo is scheduled for May 8, 2021. She reported Montevallo High School will have 2021 Graduation Monday, May 24th at 6:30 p.m. and Virtual Award's Day April 29th, 2021. Montevallo Schools will close Thursday, May 27th, 2021 at 1:00 p.m. Teachers and staff last day of school will be Friday, May 28th, 2021. She reported The American Village is still closed. See Appendix 3.

Councilwoman Mitchell called on IMPACT Director, Sarah Hogan. Sarah called on Olivia Gilbert, Junior Mayor, Montevallo Junior City Council (MJCC). Olivia reported the Bird House Art Project was completed and fun, the MJCC Youth Leadership participated in Earth Day and it was successful. She reported the MJCC is excited to be participating in the Little Free Library Project, and MJCC is planning a Drive-In movie and she reminded Council the Program is seeking applications from students from the eighth grade and up for nominations. The membership application is on the website and social media.

Sarah Hogan, Director of IMPACT Montevallo reported she had fun participating in the Scavenger Hunt and reported the Earth Day Art Project and the Earth Day week of events in partnership with Olivia Barone, Sustainability were a huge success. She advised there would be a Coalition Meeting next week and the meetings are still being held virtually. She reported there is key legislation they are monitoring closely: Senate Bill 126 passed allowing alcohol home delivery and they are already thinking of ways to ensure minors are safe, House Bill 273 deals with tobacco, Senate Bill 46 medical marijuana (plans for a filibuster), Senate Bill 334 would allow drive thru and walk-up sales of alcohol.

Councilwoman Mitchell called on Savannah Kitchens, Library Director for the Library Report. Savannah reported the 2nd dose Vaccine Clinic, sponsored by Bibb Medical Center went well with 200 participants receiving their final dose. She reported the LSTA 2021 (federal grant) have allowed them to expand to 15 Wi-Fi Hot Spots, the Summer Reading Program brochures will be distributed to the first week of May to schools and daycares with the Program launch on June 3rd, the Library is in the process of creating 2 Little Free Library book outreach stations and the MJCC is going to help with the project, and they have been awarded the Libraries Transforming Communities (grant funding) and will receive \$3,000 for upgrades to furniture in the Library. See Appendix 4.

Councilwoman Swords called on Adele Nelson for the Chamber Report. Adele reported the Chamber had a busy week: hosting the golf tournament on April 22nd at the Montevallo Golf Club with 13 teams it was a big success, and she thanked Kirk Hamby and the City Crew for all their assistance. A ribbon cutting was held for CC Event Center April 23rd at 724 Main Street, she reminded Council about the 2021 Small Business of the Year Program and asked for

nominations. May 8th the Chamber will be sponsoring an Alabama Pet Pantry at Shelby Emergency Assistance (SEA) for pet owners to get food and others to donate food. She reported The Soul Spot has a new date for its ribbon cutting of May 22nd at 10 a.m. See Appendix 5.

Courtney reported Friday Nights at the Cove will begin on April 30th at Owl's Cove featuring Cam Spinks and music will begin at 6:30 p.m. Friday Nights at the Cove events will be held the last Friday of each month for four months. She was excited to report that applications are being accepted for the Façade Grant Program and encouraged interested parties to complete the application. She also reminded Council about the Shelby County Small Business of the Year Program and asked for nominations. See Appendix 6.

Councilwoman Swords advised the Finance Committee meeting will be held on April 28th at 5:30 p.m. in Council Chambers. She also attended the MDCD meeting and reported they discussed being collaborative, the Simms Project was discussed, and she would bring new projects before City Council moving forward.

C. P. Pierson 1131 Oak Street spoke about the proposed Brierfield Prison and thought he had read it was no longer under consideration to be built.

Billy Tyler 241 Fairview Circle asked Council to consider improving the lighting at the Alabama City Cemetery on the flag to improve darkness in the area. He asked about relocating the flagpole closer to road. Alabama Power Company estimates that type of light would cost \$23.50 per month. Motion was made by Councilman King, second by Councilwoman Eisenberg, All Ayes, Motion passed.

Councilman King made a motion to pay the bills, second by Councilman Kenneth Dukes, All Ayes. Motion passed.

Public Health & Safety (Police, Fire, Code Enforcement, Housing Abatement, Planning and Zoning) – reported earlier.

Sustainability (Streets & Sanitation, Recycling, Arbor & Beautification, ValloCycle, Environmental Preservation Initiatives, and Historical Commission) – reported earlier.

Recreation, Preservation and Community Development (Parks & Recreation, Youth Athletics, Trails, Annexations) – reported earlier.

Education, Arts & Outreach (Schools, UM, Boys & Girls Club, Library, American Village, Sister City Commission, Artwalk, IMPACT) — reported earlier.

- Presentation by UM Capstone Students on Sustainable Transportation/ ValloCycle Projects: Dr. Caplow's Capstone students showed a slide presentation showing a Hiking Map that was revised for easier distribution; addressed Council to consider a Safety Officer or Safe Walk Paint by the Fire Station; Sidewalks to be considered for safety and a Bike Path Program and an Education Program to promote if/ when done. The group has prepared literature and videos for school children on sidewalk and bike safety. They also identified five sites for Bike Racks and CommuteSmart would assist, and they would have a Social Media Campaign on Facebook and Instagram for two posts to be scheduled per week. - 1. Our garbage man, James Whetsone, is a finalist for a nationally recognized Driver of the Year award.
- 2. Weatherization Program:
 - a. Reminder again: Gov. Kay Ivey has awarded grants totaling \$3.2 million to assist low-income, elderly, and disabled Alabama residents with weatherizing their homes to lower energy costs. Specifically, \$291,917 was allocated to Central Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commissions for residents within Shelby and a few neighboring counties.

Reports:

- 1. At the March 8th council meeting, we reported that Alabama Power's ALDOT permit was approved to convert the lights on state routes to LED. Alabama Power began converting the lights two weeks ago. Should be close to complete, if not done.
- 2. Earth Day was huge success with over 100 residents partipacting in all kinds of sustainable activities focused in our downtown.
- 3. Montevallo was one of the twenty five communities selected to the national Thriving Earth Exchange program through the American Geophysical Union to work on a community project. We will work with a fellow and volunteer scientist on a project to increase quality life, quantify livability, and making healthy choices. This is another partnership with IMPACT and Sustainable Montevallo.
- 4. Finally, as one of their clients for their spring semester, the University's Environmental capstone course were given two deliverables 1) Sustainable Transportation policies, initiatives, programs and 2) ValloCycle: updating procedures, programs, spaces and they have a very brief report tonight in New Business.





Duration

The duration of the shifts are 2 hours (2) long.

. The volunteer will perform routine cleanup of the stock room and gathering area


