Mayor Rusty Nix, Council Member David King, Council Member Lelia Mitchell, Council Member Kenneth Dukes, Council Member Sonya Swords, Council Member Martha Eisenberg – all Council Members were in attendance. Quorum present.

Pledge of Allegiance

Work Session called to order at 5:30 p.m. by Mayor Rusty Nix.

Discussion of Items in New Business and Other Business by Council Members. Council Members discussed the First Reading of Amendment to City Ordinance Section 24, Sec. 24-30 – Thru Truck Traffic Prohibited -clarification was made this is not a new Ordinance it's an amendment to a specific area and type of trucks prohibited for safety reasons; First Reading of Amendment to City Ordinance Section 4, Sec. 4-183. – No Parking Zones (Amended); Recommendation to amend the Budget for Municipal Court for Fiscal Year 2021 – 2022 to provide for 3% merit raises for City Municipal Court Officials (Judge, Prosecutor and Defense Attorneys, Court Translator).

Mayor Rusty Nix called for Committee Reports:

Council Member King called on Chief Littleton for the Police Department Report. Chief Littleton reported so far this month the department has had a Total of 70 Calls Reports: 12 Traffic Accidents, 35 Traffic Citations, 14 Total Arrests, 2 Burglary, 0 Auto Theft. Chief Littleton reported for Code Enforcement that there are 4 Trash and/or Debris, 1 Inoperable Vehicle, 3 Miscellaneous, 7 Continued from last period, Total Active Cases of 8 and Total Cases for the Year is 90. Council Member King called on Chief Davis, Fire Department for the Monthly Report. Chief Davis reported, Calls 1st half of October, 36 EMS Calls, 9 Lift Assists, 2 Structure Fire, 0 Brush Fire, 0 Electrical Fire, 1 Vehicle Fires, 4 Fire Alarms, 4 MVC, 2 Assist Other Agency, 3 Assist Public. Mayor Nix called on Council Member Dukes for Sustainability. Council Member Dukes called on Kirk Hamby, Public Works Department. Kirk recognized the resignation of Olivia Barone, Sustainability Coordinator and wished her the best. He reported leaf pickup has begun and they are transitioning from cutting right of way. The Brush Truck is still waiting on parts to be completed. The Veterans Banners have been approximately 85% installed.

Council Member Dukes reported Olivia Barone, Sustainability Coordinator resigned, and he read a letter of farewell emailed to him from Olivia expressing her gratitude for the leadership and support that was given for a new program in Sustainability. See Appendix 3.

Mayor Nix called on Council Member Eisenberg for Parks and Recreation. Shane Baugh, Department Head, Park and Recreation reported tournaments are wrapping up for the year. Youth basketball will

begin in the next few weeks. Critters by the Creek will be held at Shoal Creek this Sunday. Bathrooms at Stephens Park continue to be an issue. New facilities are needed especially for women.

Meeting Called to Order – Mayor Rusty Nix called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM. Present: Council Member David King, Council Member Lelia Mitchell, Council Member Kenneth Dukes, Council Member Sonya Swords, Council Member Martha Eisenberg were in attendance. Quorum present.

Recognitions / Awards: Proclamation for Red Ribbon Week read by City Clerk Steve Gilbert and presented by Mayor Rusty Nix to Police Chief Littleton and IMPACT Montevallo Director Sarah Hogan. See Appendix 4.

First Responders Commendations by the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR). Presentation made by Michael Martin, Vice President, Cahaba-Coosa Chapter / Alabama Sons of the American Revolution and awards and pins given to recipients of the Montevallo Police Department, Montevallo Fire Department, and the University of Montevallo Police Department. See Appendix 5.

Opportunities for Citizens to speak to the Council: None.

Mayor Nix called on Council Member Mitchell for reports on Education, Arts, and Outreach. Council Member Mitchell called on Savannah Kitchens, Library Director. Savannah Kitchens presented her report for the Parnell Memorial Library. Savannah reported there are more events the rest of the month at the Library: Mini Music on Tuesdays and Mr. Mac on Wednesdays; October 18-29 2nd Annual Pumpkin Decorating Contest; Senior Movie Night on October 25; they are holding a Teen Costume Contest the month of October; Tech Help Hour, October 28, and trick-or-treating October 29. November 1- November 24 the Library is running a Food for Fines program to benefit Shelby Emergency Assistance and anyone that brings in a nonperishable food item will have \$1 waived off of their fines. Library will be closed November 11, Veterans Day, and November 25-28, for Thanksgiving. See Appendix 6.

Council Member Mitchell called on Sarah Hogan, Executive Director, Impact Montevallo. Sarah reported this is Red Ribbon Week and posters are up at businesses promoting a Drug Free Lifestyle along with a Red Ribbon; National Night Out is October 26, the 2 annual Chief's Challenge will be held Wednesday at 3:30 pm between Police and Fire Chiefs. Wednesday will be the DFC House Party which is a social media contest. Impact and Police Officers will be promoting healthy lifestyles at Hometown Halloween. Sarah requested permission to shut down a portion of Island Street for National Night Out, the portion requested is from North Boundary to Park Drive from 4:00 to 9:00 PM. Appendix 7.

Council Member Mitchell called on Olivia Gilbert, Montevallo Junior City Council (MJCC) Junior Mayor. Olivia reported they volunteered at Art Stalk selling cotton candy and ran the costume contest. The MJCC is holding a double-feature Drive-In movie for Halloween. The MJCC is working on a Film Festival

to be held on November 20. The Chalk Art Contest winners received their prizes. The MHS Pep Club won first place, Montevallo Art Club won second place, and Aubry Stricklin won third place. They are still working on their Refresh Discount Card and asked Council and attendees to consider nominating a young leader in Montevallo to be recognized on social media on Super Youth Saturday.

Council Member Michell reported Montevallo Schools will be celebrating Red Ribbon Week. Montevallo Schools will be closed on November 11 for Veterans Day. She reported the American Village will be open on November 11 with free admission for the program being held from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. in the Colonial Chapel. University of Montevallo Spring/ Summer Registration for current students is November 1 and November 3 for undergraduate students. Art Walk/ Art Stalk was a great success. The Mo-Yo event held at the University Center for Arts was a great program.

Mayor Nix called on Council Member Swords for reports on Finance, Economic Development & Tourism. Council Member Swords gave the report for Courtney Bennett, Executive Director, Montevallo Main Street. Courtney thanked the organizations who put on special events last weekend, including Montevallo Art Walk, Montevallo Yoga Festival, and Impact Montevallo, that brought visitors to downtown Montevallo. She thanked the Public Works Department for their hard work installing our Veteran Banners, we now have 107. Eight representatives from Montevallo attended Main Street Alabama's Quarterly training in Wetumpka last week. Main Street Alabama announced they planned to conduct their March 2022 small-scale manufacturing training in Montevallo which should draw 70-100 attendees. Main Street is continuing to seek facilitators and sponsors for our CO.STARTERS program. See Appendix 8.

Council Member Swords gave the report for Adele Nelson, Executive Director, Montevallo Chamber of Commerce – she's attending the two day conference for the Chamber of Commerce Association of Alabama on 10/25 and 10/26. The Chamber assisted with Art Walk / Art Stalk at the Kids Korner. The Scavenger Hunt was a big hit for everyone. The Chamber participated in National Night Out. November Chatter will be delivered October 29. Montevallo Hometown Halloween will be October 29. The Montevallo Christmas Parade will be held on December 2nd and forms have been sent out. Save the date for Chamber After Hours on December 14 at UM Center for the Arts hosted by Montevallo and Shelby Chambers. See Appendix 9.

Council Member Swords reported Finance Committee will meet this Wednesday and MDCD will meet on November 8 at 1:00 PM.



APPENDIX 3

Sustainability Report City Council October 25, 2021

“As I end my time with Montevallo, I cannot thank you all enough for the support of a new program. The thoughtful leadership that saw a sustainability program as an opportunity for Montevallo to lead by example is one that I truly look up and aspire to. The support of the program by department heads, council, and mayor, active and engaged residents, city organizations, and others have allowed it to flourish. Most visibly, the recycling center, under significant changes (twice), has become a place of reusing, reducing, and recycling. The transition to single stream saved significantly on labor hours, confusion, and increased recycling participation tenfold. As of August 2021, Montevallo has recycled 120 tons compared to all of 2020 where we recycled 58 tons. Additionally, the program has secured 3 grants totally over \$100,000. In 2021, we applied for three grants – a feat in itself – the 2021 ADECA Healthy Foods Financing grant, the 2021 ADECA State Energy Program, and the Alabama Clean Fuels Grant which would total to over \$170,000 in grant funding. It’s been an exciting two years with the City, and I hope the successes of this program will lead to a brighter, greener future for Montevallo! Thank you for everything, Olivia.”

- University of Montevallo
 - Police Department: Chief, Tim Alexander (talexand@montevallo.edu)
 - Officer Jason Thrash - Officer Thrash was chosen because of his dedication to the police department and willingness to work at times when the department is shorthanded. He always has a good attitude. He remains supportive of the department, the students, faculty, and staff. This is only a few reasons he was chosen as our Officer of The Year.
- City of Montevallo
 - Police Department: Chief, Jeremy Littleton (jlittleton@cityofmontevallo.com)
 - Investigator Dustin Gray - On July 28, 2021, Investigator Dustin Gray, who is assigned to the Alabama Drug Enforcement Task Force, along with other SBI Agents executed a search warrant as part of an ongoing large-scale narcotics trafficking investigation in the Birmingham area. As Gray and the other Agents finished at the scene, they noticed that a suspect in their custody began having a medical emergency. The suspect lost consciousness and collapsed to the ground. Gray and the other Agents believed that the suspect had ingested narcotics and began rendering aid. Under the supervision of the SBI Lieutenant on scene, the suspect was given multiple doses of department issued Narcan. The suspect began to recover and admitted that he had ingested a potentially fatal dose of Heroin as the agents entered his home. Investigator Gray and the other

Agents' quick thinking and decision making led to the most favorable outcome to a spontaneous emergency, preventing the loss of the suspect's life.

- Officer TJ Wolfe - On the night of September 6 2021, Officer TJ Wolfe, a police officer and licensed EMT, was on routine patrol enroute to assist Montevallo Fire with an unrelated call, when he heard another call go out of a choking infant in Skyview Apartments. Wolfe, realizing that the Montevallo Fire Units were already dispatched to another call and that he was the closest help for the child, he notified dispatch that he would be enroute to the choking child. CAD notes stated that the child had been choking for two minutes and had stopped breathing. Officer Wolfe arrived on scene and performed a Heimlich maneuver and was able to get the child to begin breathing. Montevallo Fire and Rescue arrived shortly thereafter, examined the child and determined that the child was okay. Officer's Wolfe's quick decision to divert and render aid to the child, made the difference and resulted in a positive outcome in a potentially life threatening situation.
- Fire and Rescue: Chief, Brad Davis (bdavis@cityofmontevallo.com)
 - Fire - Shannon Blackburn - Although Shannon has only been with the Montevallo Fire Department for a few years, he has been involved in the fire service for 20 plus years. Shannon was tasked with the opportunity to lead our explorer program this year. This program is open for anyone 14-18 years old that wants to be involved and learn more about Fire and EMS. Shannon has taken the program from almost non-existent to having 10-15 young, excited members. This program is great for the department because it trains members to get them ready to join the main department when they turn 18. With his leadership, we will have several new members joining Montevallo Fire & Rescue each year.
 - EMS - Reggie Darden - Reggie was completely new to the fire service several years ago. It all started one day when he came by the department and asked if he was too old to become a firefighter. He had witnessed the fire department helping someone on a call and felt the need to join and help the community too. Since joining, Reggie has been very involved. Last year Reggie ran a total of 496 calls, which is possibly the most calls run by a member in one year in the history of Montevallo Fire & Rescue. It didn't stop there. So far in 2021 he has already run over 400 calls. Reggie also assists with the explorer program and pretty much any other task he is asked to help with. With this type of dedication, our community is a safer place with Reggie around.

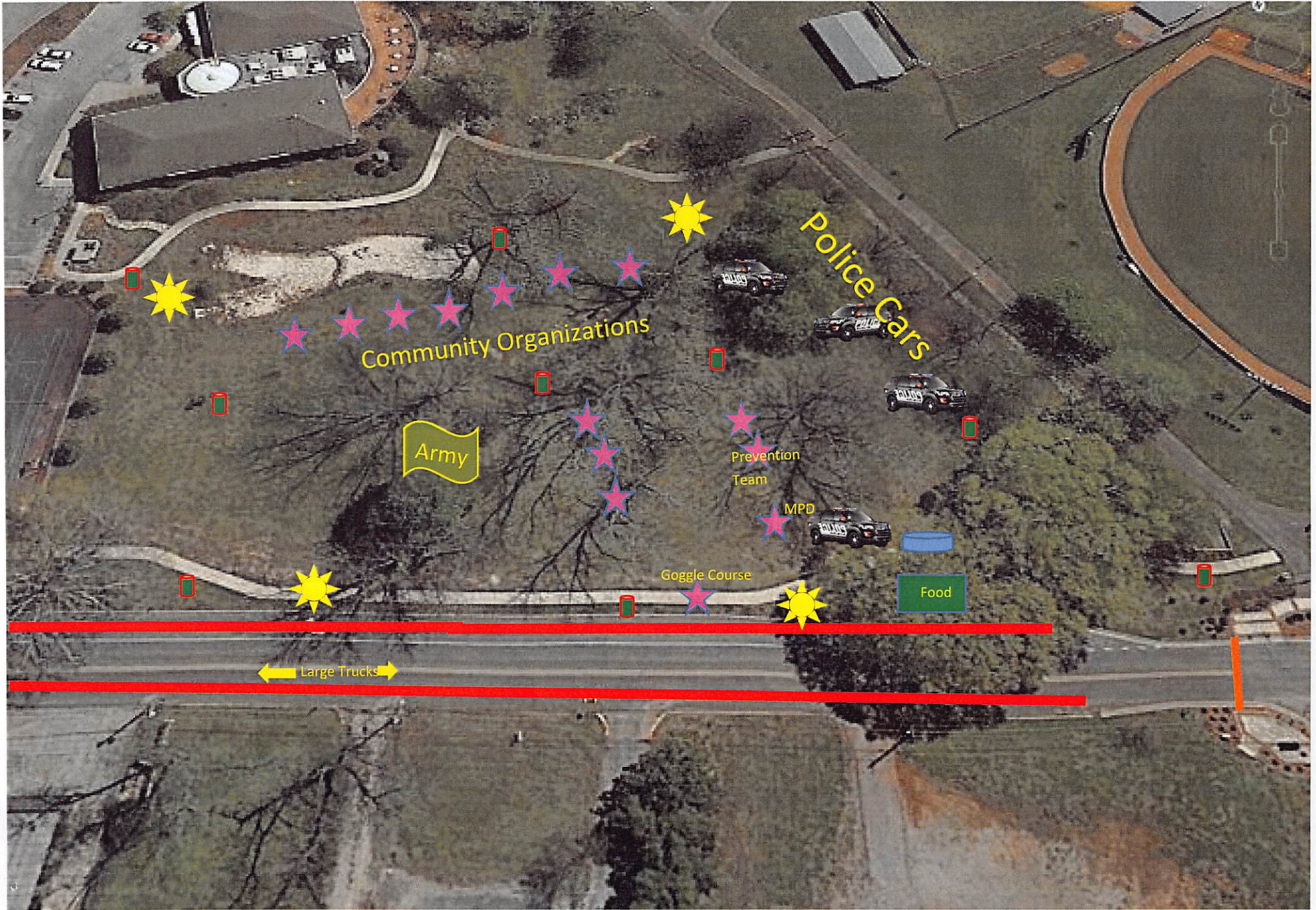

APPENDIX 10

Sec. 24-29. - Trucks prohibited; exception.

The driver of a truck with more than two axles shall not drive said vehicle on any street in the city other than those designated as federal, state, or county highways; provided, however, that this section shall not apply to trucks engaging in delivery of property to customers within the city.

Sec. 24-30 – Thru Truck Traffic Prohibited:

Streets within the City limits, maintained by the City, or under the regulatory authority of the City, based on safety factors, road conditions, road design and other factors deemed appropriate to prohibit thru traffic of trucks of more than two axels. This section shall not apply to trucks engaging in delivery of property to customers within the designated area.

Designated area(s): County Road 216 from Alabama Highway 25 / 155 to County Road 12 (Spring Creek Road)

(Code 1982, § 4-172; Ord. No. 06N, § 1, 5-22-2006)

APPENDIX 11

Sec. 4-183. – No Parking Zones (Amended)

A designated "no parking zone" is defined as follows: Any area with painted yellow curbing, any area with signs posted to indicate no parking and any and all areas in the City which are not properly designated as parking areas. Quarles street in its entirety is designated a no parking zone. The east side of Samford Street from Bowie to Quarles streets is designated a no parking zone. The northwest side of Island Street (the side nearest Main Street) between Middle Street and Main Street, and that this portion of Island Street is designated a no parking zone on any parade day, sporting event evening, or other special occasion as designated by the city clerk or the chief of police. The northwest side of Alabama Street (the side nearest Main Street); the northeast side of Block Street (in front of the Moon Thornton Memorial High School Ag Building) between Main and Valley Streets, and the southeast side of Main Street from Bloch Street to Valley Street are designated no parking zones. **The East and West side of North Boundary Street from Valley Street to Oak Street.**
