Mayor Nix opened the work session at 5:30 p.m.

Councilman King reported that the Planning and Zoning Commission Meeting would be held at 6:00 PM on January 21st in Council Chamber.

Councilman Dukes reported for ValloCycle on the meeting to be held January 19 at 6:00 PM at City Hall. Kirk Hamby, Public Works Director, reported the new Brush Trailer has been ordered and expended delivery time is 12 weeks. The banners on Main Street will be the Make Your Mark Theme and will be in place of 2 months. Street crews are prepared, with sand and gravel for icing, if winter weather strikes in the few weeks.

The Council approved the Order of Business and Agenda items (framework of agenda) via an Ordinance adopted at their first session.

Question #2 Why are the Dollar General Stores different in construction? City Clerk Gilbert replied that the Dollar General Store on Highway 119 is in the Scenic Corridor therefore there are different requirements on the visual appearance of the structure that are not required in the Highway 25 Business District.

- •Resolution # 01112021-305 to allow the Mayor to execute an agreement for Professional Engineering Services with Garver USA in conjunction with ALDOT Project No. TAPAA-TA21(924) Sidewalks along SR 25. Discussion: Councilwoman Mitchell expressed the need for lightning which stopped at the Sgt Robert Farrington Jr. Bridge and did not continue from the bridge to SR25. Why were lights for the sidewalk left off Alabama Hwy 119 (Selma Road) to SR 25 and the safety of students and others walking in the dark and in danger; was it because this was a black community? A citizen was killed early one Sunday morning on this highway. Why are we skipping from the bridge to SR 25 and not putting lights up on Alabama 119 (Selma Road) for safety and voting on another project on Hwy SR25?". See Appendix 9.

Public works Director Hamby said they were aware of the damaged done to the tree during the recent storm and would investigate having it completely removed. Councilwoman Swords also asked that we request the limbs from storm damage be removed from the yard of a residence on the corner Shoshone and Tuscaloosa Street. Chief Littleton will ask Code Officer Wilder to notify the property owner to remove the limbs or place them where the City Crew can load them with the brush truck.

Patricia Gilmore of 111 Selma Road asked the Council to further consider the need for additional lighting along the areas of Selma Road as addressed earlier by Councilwoman Mitchell.







Sec. 10-31. - Violations; imposition of penalty not to excuse violation; continuing violations; removal of prohibited conditions.

(a)Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the Fire Prevention Code adopted by this article or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detail statement or specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or any certificate or permit issued thereunder, and from which no appeal has been taken, or who shall fail to comply with such an order as affirmed or modified by the mayor or city council or by a court of competent jurisdiction, within the time fixed herein, shall severally for each such violation and noncompliance, respectively, be guilty of a misdemeanor. The Fire Chief and or the designated appointee(s) (Inspector), shall notify in writing the person(s) in violation of noncompliance with the ordinance and shall set a period of not less than 15 calendar days nor more than 30 calendar days an opportunity to correct the violation and /or noncompliance. When not otherwise specified, each 30 calendar days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense. Failure to comply with written notice shall result in the penalties set forth as follows:

First violation and noncompliance shall be fined \$100.00 plus any applicable costs of court; \$250.00 plus any applicable costs of court for the second offense, \$500.00 plus any applicable costs of court for the third offense and may be fined or jailed at the discretion of the municipal judge up to the limits of municipal jurisdiction for a fourth or subsequent offense.

In the event of subsequent offenses of violation and noncompliance, the municipal governing body shall set a time for hearing on the matter of revoking or refusing to renew a business license; and a notice of such hearing shall be given to the licensee, or the applicant for renewal, as the case may be, at least 15 days before the day set for said hearing. At the hearing, the municipal governing body shall hear all evidence offered by any party and all evidence that may be presented bearing upon the question of revocation or the refusal of renewal and render a determination by majority vote of the governing body. The person(s) aggrieved by the decision shall have the right to appeal the decision of the governing body to the Shelby County Circuit Court by filing an appeal and appeal bond equal to the fine within ten (10) days of the vote. (b)The imposition of one penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time. When not otherwise specified, each 30 days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense. The application of the above penalty shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

It is our understanding this project is to utilize Alabama Department of Transportation (ALDOT) Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) funds. As such, we have formulated our scope of work, summarized below, accordingly:

- Perform topography, feature and utility surveys throughout the project corridor
- Locate property markers along existing easements and rights-of-way, research deeds and develop a Right-of-Way map for use in final plan development
- Perform engineering design services required to develop final construction plans in accordance with ALDOT specifications to include:
 - New concrete sidewalk, wheelchair ramps, ADA-compliant driveway improvements and drainage structure modifications utilizing existing ALDOT right-of-way along SR-25 from the intersection with SR-119 to approximately 0.10 miles east of Middle Street
 - Required ALDOT submittals in accordance with established TAP procedural guidelines
 - Preparation of bid documents and facilitation of Pre-Bid Meeting and Project Letting(s)
- Traffic signal modifications at the intersection of SR-25 and Middle Street for the proposed pedestrian crossing signal heads
- Cooperation with ALDOT Local Transportation Bureau personnel, including a project kickoff meeting, environmental coordination, and project review meetings (as necessary)

EXTENDING THE EMERGENCY PAID SICK LEAVE POLICY THRU MARCH 31, 2021 FOR EMPLOYEE QUARANTINE AND OR POSITIVE COVID-19 SICKNESS

FFCRA Leave Requirements Expired Dec. 31, 2020

The requirement that employers provide paid sick leave and expanded family and medical leave under the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA) expired on Dec. 31, 2020. While this leave has expired by directive of the government, the City of Montevallo maintains its commitment and concern for the employees that serve our City during this unprecedented time.

The City has voluntarily extended the <u>Emergency Paid Sick Leave</u> thru March 31, 2021 in which at that time the program will be evaluated. We must all do our part to combat this virus by wearing a mask, socially distancing, frequent hand washing and monitoring of signs and symptoms. Working together we will meet this challenge and resume normal activities.

The provisions of the emergency paid sick leave are as follows effective this date of January 11, 2021, all other prior provisions are voided as of this effective date:

➤ Hours provided under policy: 80 hours for full time employees, part time employees are eligible to receive an average number of hours based on the previous two pay periods worked.

Total hours allotted for Full and Part Time Employees are for potential use thru March 31, 2021 or the time the program is deemed expired)

> All hours missed outside of the emergency sick paid leave parameters listed within this policy are to be utilized by personal time of the employee and do not qualify for emergency sick paid leave.

Eligibility: All full- and part-time employees unable to work due to one of the following reasons may request **Emergency Paid Sick Leave** and are required to follow the established protocol as a response to COVID-19 to ensure the protection of employees and the citizens we serve.

1. Direct Exposure:

Employee to provide copy of the positive COVID-19 test of whom direct exposure occurred from within the last 48 hours; self-quarantining without documentation of exposure is not permitted.

- Employee may be required to quarantine for a period of 7 days per the CDC guidelines if deemed to have direct exposure. Supervisor and HR to determine thru contact tracing.
- If Direct Exposure is determined, employee will be required to guarantine for 7 days.
- COVID-19 testing 7 Day quarantine: Employee is to be tested on Day 5 of the 7-day quarantine period. Upon results of the COVID-19 test resulting in a negative test and if no symptoms are reported during daily monitoring of the quarantine period without the use of medication, the employee may return to work on Day 8.

2. Positive Test Results

If an employee tests positive, the emergency paid sick leave may be requested. In addition, the following procedures must be followed in relation to quarantine procedures:

- Copy of the test is to be provided to the employee's Supervisor and HR.
- Employee will be sent home to quarantine for 10 days per the CDC guidelines. Quarantine
 for 10 days requires the employee to maintain social distancing from the public to prevent
 potential exposure and transmission of COVID-19. Failure to comply with the quarantine
 procedures may result in discontinuation of compensation, if provided, and or disciplinary
 action.
- At the end of 10 days from the date the positive test was administered, if the employee
 has no new or worsening symptoms, and has had no fever for 24 hours without
 medication, employee must submit a completed form from a licensed medical provider
 stating they are cleared to work. Employee should contact their Supervisor immediately
 and be placed back on the work schedule.
- Failure to immediately return to work after meeting above stated requirements may result in discontinuation of compensation if provided and or disciplinary action.

Department Supervisors and HR will administer the policy and procedures set within.
