2022 National Suicide Prevention Week Proclamation

In Recognition of the 2022 National Suicide Prevention Week

This Proclamation recognizes suicide as a national and statewide public health problem, and suicide prevention as a national and statewide responsibility, and designates **September 4 through September 10** as "National Suicide Prevention Week" in Alabama. This week overlaps World Suicide Prevention Day, September 10, recognized internationally and supported by the World Health Organization.

- WHEREAS, suicide is the 12th leading cause of death in the United States, the 3rd leading cause of death among children and teens ages 10-19 and the 2nd leading cause of death among individuals between the ages of 20 to 34;
- WHEREAS, in the United States over 45,000 people died by suicide in 2020 (Centers for Disease Control);
- WHEREAS, suicide rates have increased 30% over the last two decades, with suicide rates finally decreasing 2.1% between 2018 and 2019 and decreasing 2.9% between 2019 and 2020;
- WHEREAS, it is estimated that in 2020, there were 1.2 million suicide attempts;
- WHEREAS, in 2020, suicide was the 13th leading cause of death in Alabama (Centers for Disease Control);
- WHEREAS, in 2020, 793 people died by suicide in Alabama (Centers for Disease Control);
- WHEREAS, over 90% of the people who die by suicide have a diagnosable and treatable mental health condition, although often that condition was not recognized or treated;
- WHEREAS, organizations such as the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention are dedicated to saving lives
 and bringing hope to those affected by suicide, through research, education, advocacy, and resources for those
 who have lost someone to suicide or who struggle, and urge that we:
 - Recognize suicide as a preventable national and state public health problem and declare suicide prevention to be a priority.
 - 2. Acknowledge that no single suicide prevention program or effort will be appropriate for all populations or communities.
 - Address the disparity in access to mental healthcare for underserved and underrepresented groups, and advocate for ending these disparities.
 - 4. Fund new suicide research to support culturally-informed and evidence-based mental health care and services.



- 5. Encourage initiatives based on the goals contained in the National Strategy for Suicide Prevention.
- 6. Promote awareness that there is no single cause for suicide, and that suicide most often occurs when stressors exceed the coping abilities of someone struggling with a mental health condition.
- 7. Develop and implement strategies to improve and increase access to quality mental health, substance abuse, and suicide prevention services and programs.
- 8. Continue advocacy to ensure we can reimagine a comprehensive suicide, mental health, and substance use crisis response system that builds on the historic new 988 number for the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline.

Therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that, I, Rusty Nix, Mayor of Montevallo, do hereby designate September 4 - 10, 2022, as "National Suicide Prevention Week" in Montevallo, Alabama.

SEMI-ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT: JANUARY – JULY 2022:

VAPING CLASSES:

FLAVOR BAN:

O August 2nd was the deadline for submitting comments to the FDA on the proposed rules that would prohibit the sale of menthol cigarettes and flavored cigars across the country. We should receive notice of their decision in the coming weeks. And then I will work with the Police Department to ensure all store owners are aware of any changes in tobacco sales.

 Impact Montevallo was honored to co-receive an award at last week's Main Street Alabama LAB conference for our Spring Fling Family Food Truck Fest we held last April. The event was enjoyed by so many of our local families and we plan to host the event again next year.

A Resolution Establishing the Montevallo African American Heritage Trail

WHEREAS, The Montevallo African American Heritage Trail Initiative was established on MLK Day, 2017 to promote awareness of and preserve significant sites in Black History and Culture in Montevallo; and,

WHEREAS, the Montevallo Historic Preservation Commission has since that time researched and identified sites deemed of historical significance to the African American Community and the Montevallo Community at large; and,

WHEREAS, the African American Heritage Trail will promote awareness of the accomplishments and strength of African American individuals and their families, by recognizing their stories, and structures in the community, to offer an inclusive history that honors their legacy for future generations; and,

WHEREAS, the African American Heritage Trail will utilize markers, plaques, photographs, maps, signage and digital resources to recognize and preserve these sites; and,

WHEREAS, the Montevallo Historic Preservation Commission will coordinate with the City Council, private citizens, and corporations for funding of and deployment of historic markers and plaques; and

WHEREAS, the City of Montevallo desires to make available funding resources for the establishment of the Montevallo African American Heritage Trail;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MONTEVALLO, ALABAMA AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Council hereby authorizes the office of the City Clerk / Treasurer to establish an annual budget within the Historic Preservation Commission to provide for the funding to create, install, and maintain historic markers, plaques and associated items on the Montevallo African American Heritage Trail.

Section 2. That total funding shall be based upon recommendations prepared by the Historic Preservation Commission and submitted for annual departmental budget approval.

PROPOSED MONTEVALLO AFRICAN AMERICAN HERITAGE TRAIL — Developed by Kathy King and Anitka Stewart Sims in consultation with Montevallo Historic Preservation Commission

The Montevallo African American Heritage Trail (MAAHT) initiative was launched MLK Day 2017 by Mayor Hollie Cost. Development of the Trail in its earliest phase was led by Rev. Kenneth Dukes, who formed a committee to explore neglected or forgotten aspects of Black history in Montevallo and the surrounding communities. Initially the committee sought to identify "firsts" — first family, first school, first business, first church. The pandemic brought this first discovery phase to a halt for two years. Research resumed late in 2020 and began gaining momentum spring 2021 under the auspices of the Montevallo Historic Preservation Commission. Work on early Black churches, Prentice High School, and the Prentice family soon broadened into exploration of early schools, sites of slave labor, cemeteries, local sports heroes, forgotten Black districts of town, stories of life during the Jim Crow era, episodes in the local civil rights struggle — pieces of the African American past that, placed alongside one another, form a richly textured narrative of Black lives and experience. Some of these findings have been presented in monthly articles in Montevallo's *Chamber Chatter* in a series called Untold Stories of Black Montevallo. The Commission is still in the process of discovery and identification of significant sites, but it is now possible to propose possible sites on the Trail. Others remain to be added.

Mission statement The Trail uses markers, plaques, photographs, maps, signage, and digital resources to recognize and preserve significant sites in Black history and culture in the Montevallo area.

Vision statement The Trail promotes awareness of the accomplishments and strength of African American individuals, families, and communities. Sites along the Trail recover and preserve stories and structures that offer a more inclusive history of our town and stand as a legacy for young people and future generations.

Scope of the Trail The historical reach extends from the period of enslavement (ca. 1817) through the Civil War and Reconstruction, and into the Jim Crow era and local Civil Rights movement (1960s and 1970s). Geographically, the Trail may include the nearby communities of Brierfield, Wilton, Almont, and Aldrich.

Themes of the Trail Following the abolition of slavery, freed persons of African descent hungered for knowledge and for freedom to worship with their own people in their own way. They organized and raised funds to establish their own schools and churches. Many sites on the Trail highlight Black-organized places of education and worship.

C. and Mary Eliza Cunningham who converted the abandoned schoolhouse into a dwelling that still stands at 1025 Island St.

A lifelong resident of Aldrich, he was a property owner, registered voter, and leading figure in the Montevallo community until his death in 1944. Some have argued that Montevallo Middle School should be renamed Prentice Middle School as a way to recognize and carry forward his legacy.

Signage to indicate that property along Selma Road, once owned by wealthy Black businessman Hampton D. Lee and his wife Exie Lee, residents of Marion, AL, was the location of Montevallo's Black business and entertainment district during the Jim Crow era.
